ABOUT US

In 1919, on the sidelines of the Paris Peace Conference, the British diplomat Lionel Curtis advocated the creation of an institute for the study of international affairs. His vision was to foster mutual understanding between nations and for such an institute to propose solutions to the biggest challenges facing the world. The Royal Institute of International Affairs London (better known today as Chatham House) was established in 1920, and over time, further institutes were founded overseas.

On 22 June 1925, Chatham House members in Victoria met to discuss founding an overseas branch in Melbourne. Its first Chairman was the Rt Hon J.G. Latham, from 1925-1933, followed by former Prime Minister Sir Robert Menzies from 1933 to 1948 and the Rt Hon Sir Owen Dixon from 1948 to 1964.

In 1933 the various state branches formed a federal organisation, the Australian Institute of International Affairs ("AIIA"), Australia's longest-existing private research institute on politics and international relations.

The AllA's mission is **to help Australians know, understand, and engage more in international affairs**. It does this through an extremely active nationwide and international agenda, grounded in principles of political neutrality and open debate.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

We are 100 years old ...

... and our mission has never been more important. The outside world has been turned upside down, globalisation is in retreat, old alliances are in doubt. Australia is not immune to the changing tides of international affairs: our longest-standing strategic ally is on a path to isolation and our strongest economic partner spies on us and intimidates our citizens. Our region is now riven by a contest for power not seen since World War 2 while, globally, nations militarise and re-arm.



Yet many Australians seem largely oblivious of the outside world. For much of our history, distance has been not a tyranny but a blessing – allowing Australians to focus on our own well-being rather than global affairs – but that is no longer the case. Our mission to help Australians be more interested in International Affairs and understand better what's happening in the outside world is now critically important.

AllA Victoria is striving to rise to the challenge.

We have delivered an informative and relevant program of events that attempts to keep abreast of global changes. For example, in a recent collaborative event with an Indian think tank, we explored the necessity for India and Australia to expedite free trade between both nations as a necessary response both to Trump's tariffs and potential Chinese economic coercion. We have, as a result, signed Memoranda of Understanding with two Indian organisations and are currently negotiating a third with a Sri Lankan think tank.

We seek to expand our membership, broadening the reach of our Institute and make more Victorians (and Australians more widely) interested in international affairs.

We have also maintained our drive to engage Victoria's business community in international affairs. Under the leadership of Council Member Mohammad Chowdhury, we have added

momentum to our corporate initiative, and we now offer a program of daytime events designed to appeal to a corporate audience.

The sale of Dyason House has proven essential to permit all this. We recognise that the resulting move into the CBD has not been convenient for everyone but, overall, it has revitalised the Institute and permitted a much wider range of events than before. The cash released by the sale has been wisely invested and now provides considerable annual income as well as healthy accumulation of capital. The Institute is in a strong financial position, although we still need to do more to make income from operations balance expenditure on salaries, rather than rely on investments (which we all know can go down as well as up).

This is my final Annual Report as President. I stand down at this year's AGM after five years' service to the Institute. It's been an enormous privilege and a pleasure to meet so many of our members, both long-standing and newly-joined. We have achieved much in the past five years, largely due to our extraordinary staff – in particular our Executive Director Alastair Roff (an absolute tower of strength), our General Manager Rita Vago, our Office Assistant Talia Prime, and our Young Professionals Program Manager Aneesah Fowzie. And, of course, all our former employees who proudly supported and promoted our Institute but have now moved on to the next stage of their careers.

Despite our excellent professional staff, we remain a largely volunteer organisation. All our Council Members give their time, expertise and effort freely and I'm particularly grateful for their support and guidance over the past five years as we guided the Institute out of Covid and into a period of sustained growth. I must single out for special mention our two Vice Presidents, Estelle Parker and John Richardson, and our Treasurer Christopher Cicutto – their collective wisdom has very largely influenced our strategic direction and has underpinned our success.

I'm also overwhelmed with gratitude for our interns and volunteers who work tirelessly to deliver our programme and make the Institute tick. Anyone who visits our offices during the working day will meet them and understand how important they are to us. We think we offer Australia's largest intern programme in International Relations and this has been our secret weapon in our post-Covid renaissance.

Good fortune to AIIA Victoria for the next 100 years!

FINANCES

Operating Result

The financial year concluded with an overall profit (including other comprehensive income) of \$191,076 (prior year: \$123,938) primarily driven by the strong performance of our investment income and capital growth within the investment portfolio. Despite this positive outcome, we faced challenges in our operating and member-based activities yet successfully delivered this result.

Consistent with our earlier decision to sell Dyason House and reinvest the proceeds into an investment portfolio, the income generated from this portfolio has been instrumental in covering major costs associated with member-based activities, such as occupancy and certain employee expenses, as we continue to expand our offerings for both existing and new

members. This approach was also applied in the previous financial year. Importantly, we have not experienced any further erosion of the corpus while using investment income to support these initiatives.

In addition, we received substantial funding during the financial year that will assist in maintaining member-based activities in the coming year. We remain deeply grateful for the significant support and funding from our members and partner organisations, which continues to be invaluable in meeting the needs of AIIA Victoria and its members.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

2024-25 was another active year for AIIA Victoria, culminating in the significant milestone of the Institute's Centenary.

The speaker events program during the year covered a wide range of topics: Indo-Pacific Security; Hong Kong's national security Law five years on; America's relations with China; an assessment of China's economic trajectory; Taiwan; Russia and North Korea relations; the state of democracy; populism and authoritarianism; UN peace



operations and human rights; and elections in the UK, France and the United States. Richard Iron's insightful analysis of the Russo-Ukraine war continued to draw an audience.

A full list of topics and speakers is listed in the Appendix on pages 13-15. Thanks go to Events Program Interns Erin French, Oliver Kelly and Michayla Bayliss for their valuable assistance in researching data, creating flyers, and setting up events.

The more flexible layout and central location of the Collins Street office are ideal for roundtables, which have covered international trade and diplomacy with Senator the Hon Simon Birmingham; supply chain resilience; and Victoria's potential in the global economy. A



panel discussion on AUKUS Pillar II held jointly with the Victorian Government (Defence) presented a unique opportunity for some of our intern team to attend the Avalon International Airshow in March.

This continued the active *Corporate Engagement* program led by Mohammad Chowdhury and his intern team (Carlo Nicholls, Emily Ragg, Joshua Lee, and

Andrew Wang), using the Institute's convening power to bring together government, business and academia to explore how Victoria can integrate and thrive in a globalising world.

In May it was a pleasure to host the AIIA National Board in Melbourne for the first time, offering members the opportunity to hear from National President Dr Heather Smith PSM FAIIA.

Two other events require comment, which even though taking place in July and September, required significant planning and resource during the financial year.

We were honoured that to mark the Institute's **Centenary**, our Patron HE Professor the Honourable Margaret Gardner AC, Governor of Victoria hosted a reception at Government House. The Instagram reel of the event produced by Government House is available **here**.









In September, AllA Victoria helped to organise the first trip to Australia of **Yulia Navalnaya**, widow of murdered Russian opposition leader Alexei Navalny. It was a complex and busy schedule, including appointments in Canberra with both the Prime Minister and the Minister of Foreign Affairs. In Melbourne, Yulia Navalnaya was interviewed at our office by renowned journalist Peter Hartcher, moderated by Michael Bachelard, in an event co-hosted with the Melbourne Press Club.

In the meantime, the office team underwent some changes during the year. After the two-year contract of Dr Patricia Salas Sanchez finished, we were fortunate to secure the services of Rita Vago as our General Manager. The former Trade Commissioner of Hungary to Australia, Rita has brought energy and expertise to the role. Hannah Bourke our Office Coordinator secure a full-time role with La Trobe Asia, but we were able to replace her with Talia Prime, who had previously interned with us. The fourth member of our team is Aneesah Fowzie, who recently joined in the new role of Program Manager (Young Professionals) to drive the program for our younger members. (The latter role is supported by a generous grant from the Sir Wilfred and C.H. (Roger) Brookes Charitable Foundation). We also could not operate without the time and effort so generously given by our many Interns and volunteers, and more details of their contribution are given later.

And of course, we sincerely appreciate the interest and support shown by all the Institute's members and their guests at our events, as well as the speakers who so readily give of their time and expertise.

Further sections below cover the *International Careers Conference*; the *Sir Zelman Cowen Oration*, and an academic conference co-hosted with the Centre of Excellence for the Elimination of Violence against Women (CEVAW).

The ongoing support and encouragement of the team at the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT) Victoria State Office for our program is greatly appreciated.

The <u>Walter Mangold Trust Fund</u> has again provided generous support to our young people. Their funding has allowed our Young Professionals members to attend events free of charge.

Once again, our sincere thanks to all who have been involved in the Speaker Events program and the wider activities of the Institute in whatever capacity, and we look forward to continuing an equally stimulating program in the year to come.

STUDY TOURS

Canberra: 10-14 November 2024.

Following the success of the inaugural Young Professionals Study Tour in 2023, AIIA Victoria again subsidised a group of 14 young people to go to Canberra. The immersive 5-day study tour provided unique insights into the political, international, cultural, and historical landscape of Australia's capital.

Participants had full access to the AlIA National Conference, including a day of pre-Conference masterclasses, an evening reception at the Embassy of the Netherlands, the fullday Conference itself, and attendance at the Gala Dinner held at the National Arboretum.

The remaining program included a briefing and tour at the Embassy of Spain; a roundtable discussion at the ANU National Security College; a private tour of the Parliamentary Press gallery at Parliament House kindly hosted by ABC foreign correspondent Stephen Dzeidzic, and a meeting with DFAT's Office of Climate Change & Mitigation.

Expertly organised and led by Intern Annabelle Marshall, the tour presented the group with exclusive opportunities for insightful discussions on a range of topics with some of the country's top foreign policy experts and practitioners and offered an unparalleled opportunity for knowledge enrichment and networking.

India: 25 February – 5 March 2025.



Nine participants took part in a comprehensive tour to New Delhi, Agra and Mumbai, led by AllA VIC Council members Dr. Michael Moignard (former Senior Trade commissioner in New Delhi) and Prakash Mirchandani, ably supported by Intern Manisha Vishnoi.

As always, public diplomacy meetings were interspersed with visits to World Heritage cultural sites. After an initial briefing on the bilateral relationship from the Australian High Commission, meetings were held with the CEO of Deakin University in India, and the Observer Research

Foundation where maritime security and the Australia-India Free Trade Agreement were discussed. Meetings with CUTS International (Consumer Unity and Trust Society) and The Geostrata, a youth-led think tank, have led to subsequent MOUs being signed with both organisations, with a view to future joint events.

Other insightful meetings were held with Austrade; the national Stock Exchange; the Confederation of Indian Industry, and Gateway House: Indian Council on Foreign Relations. Cultural visits included Humayun's Tom in Old Delhi, Elephanta Island, and of course the Taj Mahal and the Agra Fort.

Looking ahead, planning started during the year for a Study Tour in June 2026 to Sri Lanka.

SIR ZELMAN COWEN ORATION

Former Governor-General and legal expert Sir Zelman Cowen AK GCMG GCVO QC dedicated his life to engaging the Australian public in international affairs. To honour this commitment and his role as past Patron of the Institute, AIIA Victoria's annual *Sir Zelman Cowen Oration*

features an eminent speaker discussing a current issue that affects how Australia engages with the world.

The 17th *Sir Zelman Cowen Oration* was delivered by **Amanda Lacaze**, CEO and Managing Director of Lynas Rare Earths, the world's only significant producer of separated rare earth materials outside China. Taking as her topic *Critical Minerals, Renewable Energy Transition and Global Security,* members and their guests were treated to an illuminating and humorous overview of the importance of critical minerals in geopolitics. The fortuitous timing that President Trump had announced the imposition of tariffs and an associated carve-out for critical minerals that same day, added to the relevance of the theme.

Over 140 members and their guests enjoyed the ambience of the W Hotel Melbourne. Council member Justin Meyer is thanked for organising the event.



ACADEMIC CONFERENCE

In June, AIIA Victoria in partnership with the ARC Centre of Excellence for the Elimination of Violence Against Women (<u>CEVAW</u>), co-hosted a landmark two-day conference titled *Justice Denied: Fighting Widespread Impunity for Conflict-Related Sexual Violence (CRSV)*.

Led by Professor Jacqui True FASSA FAIIA, CEVAW is the world's first Centre to address the full range of forms of violence against women in Australia and the Indo-Pacific region.



Working closely with AIIA VIC president Richard Iron CMG OBE, the CEVAW team brought together over 200 delegates from across the Indo-Pacific region, including 35 distinguished speakers, to engage in interdisciplinary dialogue and critical reflection on the prevalence and impact of CRSV.

Discussions highlighted the challenges in addressing sexual and gender-based violence in fragile contexts, as well as the urgent need for international collaboration and accountability.

The conference benefited from high-profile contributions, including a special video address by Baroness Arminka Helić, former adviser to former British Foreign Secretary William Hague and current member of the House of Lords, Parliament of the United Kingdom and a keynote presentation by Professor Kim Thuy Seelinger, Director of the Center for Human Rights, Gender, and Migration at Washington University in St. Louis. AllA VIC further amplified the program by coordinating Professor Seelinger's live interview on ABC's *The World* and facilitating an address from His Excellency Mr Vasyl Myroshnychenko, Ambassador of Ukraine to Australia, who shared timely insights with the Melbourne audience.

The conference stands as a strong example of AIIA VIC's commitment to convening global expertise, fostering dialogue, and advancing understanding on critical issues of human rights and international affairs. (The report on the Conference proceedings can be <u>accessed here</u>).



At an evening reception at the State Library of Victoria, the keynote address was delivered by HE Stephanie Copus Campbell AM, Ambassador for Gender Equality.
