The tour officially started on Wednesday 26 February. The first appointment was at the Australian High Commission in Chanakyapuri. The group met with the Deputy High Commissioner, Nick McCaffery and staff of the High Commission, who gave us a high - level briefing of the Indo-Australian trade and political relationship.



A visit to Humayun's Tomb and the step well (Baoli) in Old Delhi before lunch - a fascinating immersion into Mughal-era Delhi, and a precursor to the Taj Mahal.



Meeting with Ravneet Pahwa, CEO of Deakin University in India. Deakin's program now includes the first foreign campus in India (Gujarat). Our next meeting was with CUTS International (Consumer Unity and Trust Society) chaired by Mr Pradeep Mehta, Secretary General. Invited guests included Ambassador Anil Wadhwa, Ambassador Amit Das Gupta, and Tom Sandeford, Australian High Commission. Trade and investment issues were discussed.
